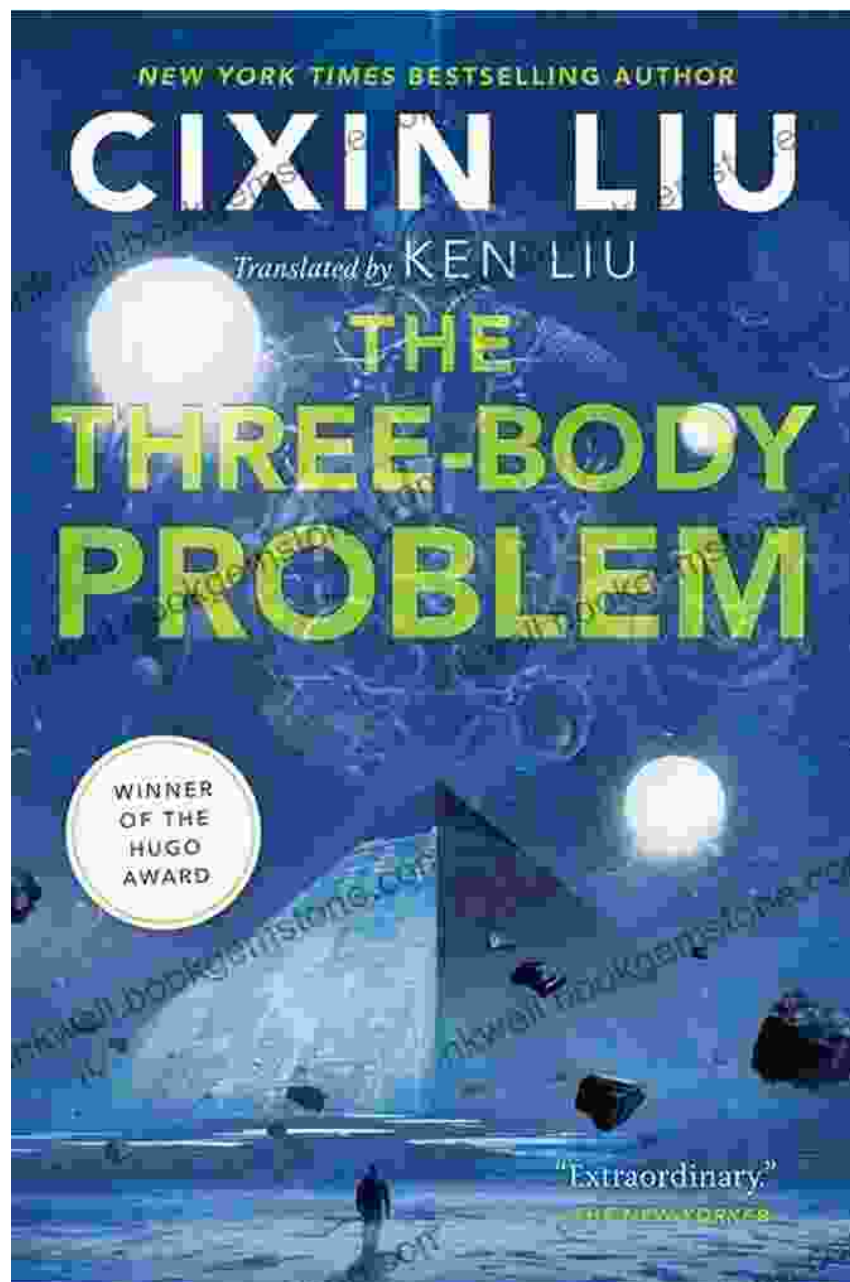

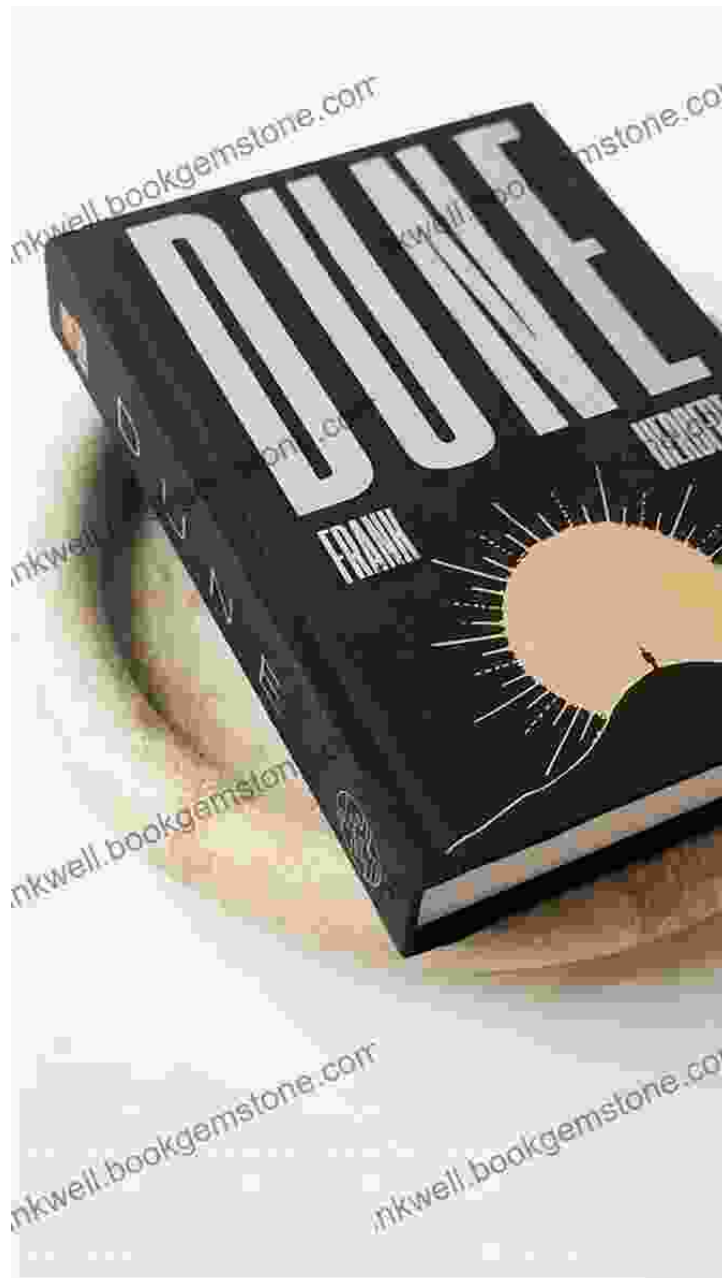

1. The Three-Body Problem by Cixin Liu



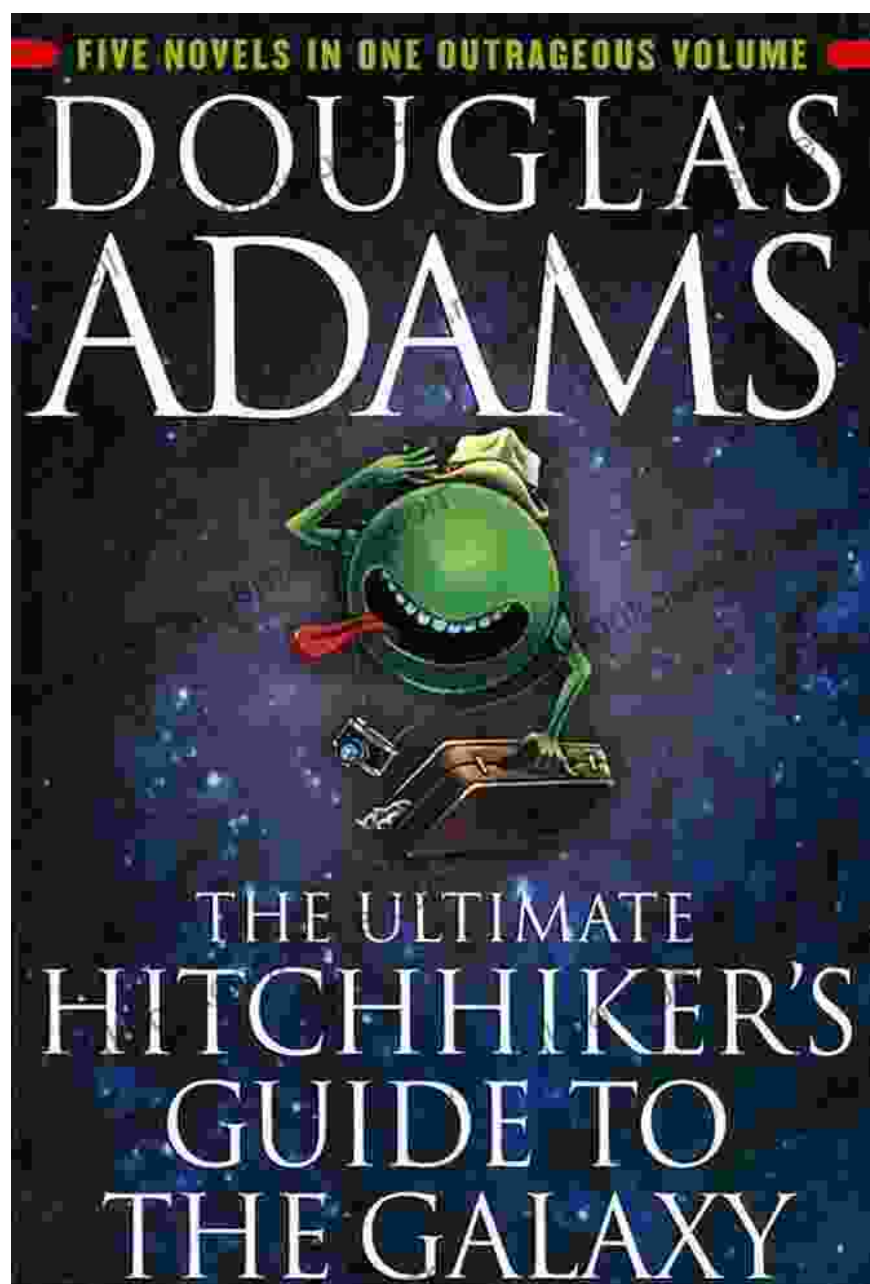

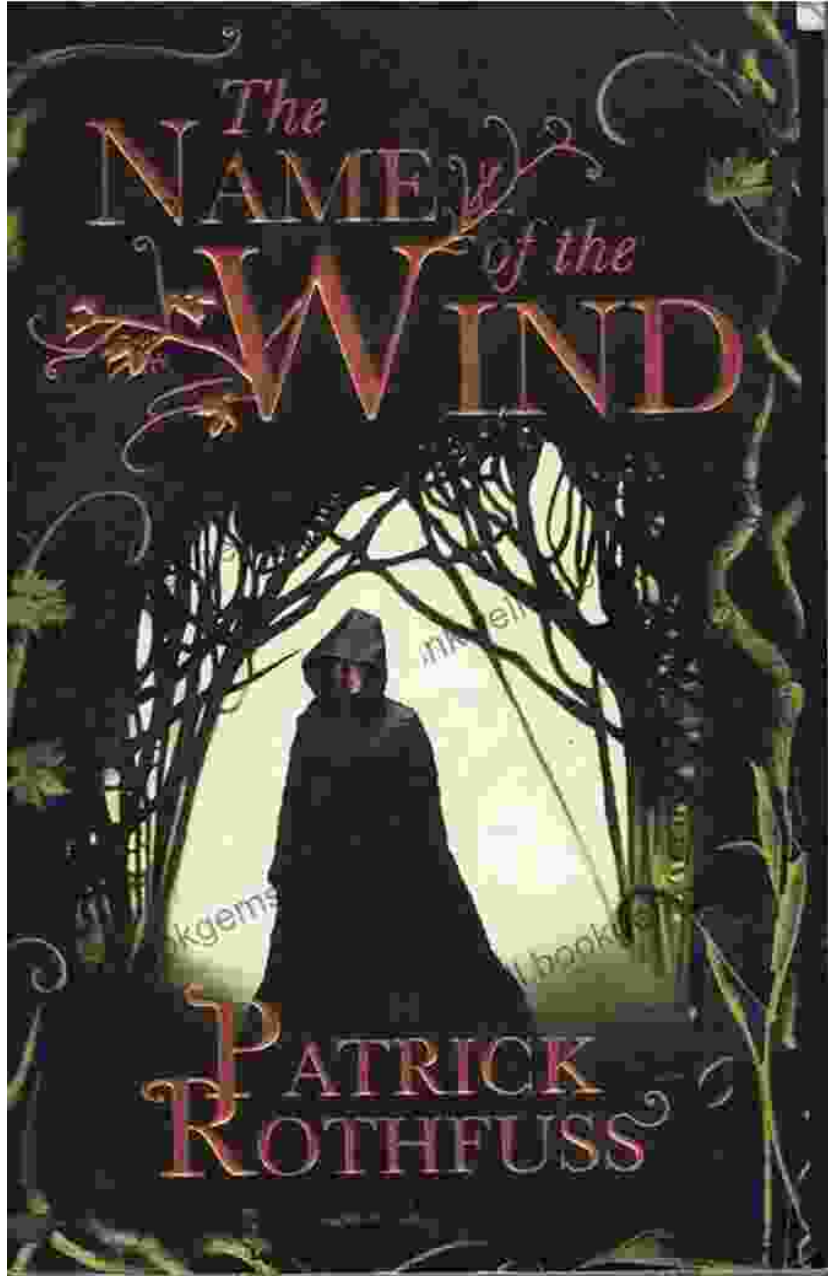
3. The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy by Douglas Adams

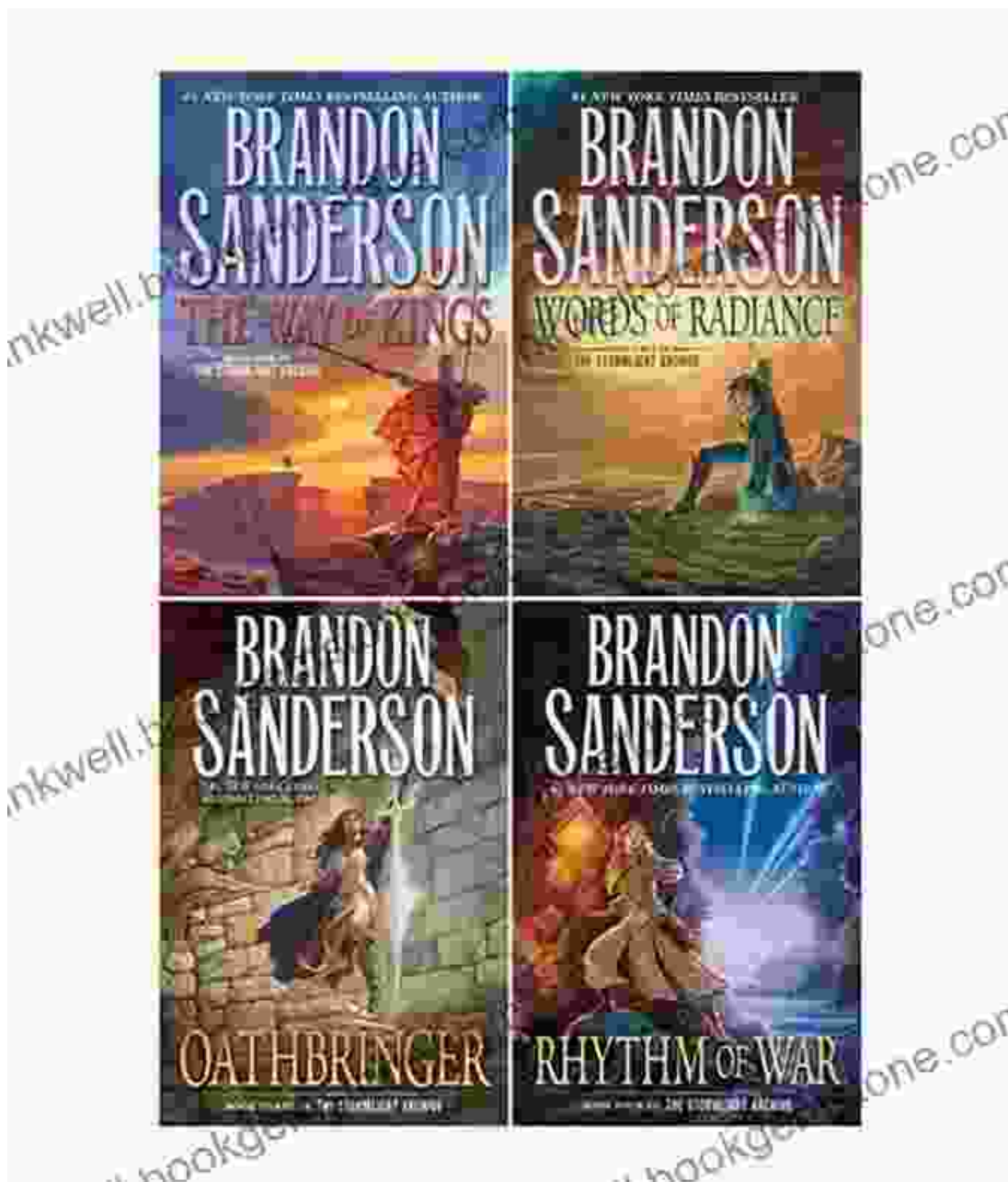

1. The Name of the Wind by Patrick Rothfuss



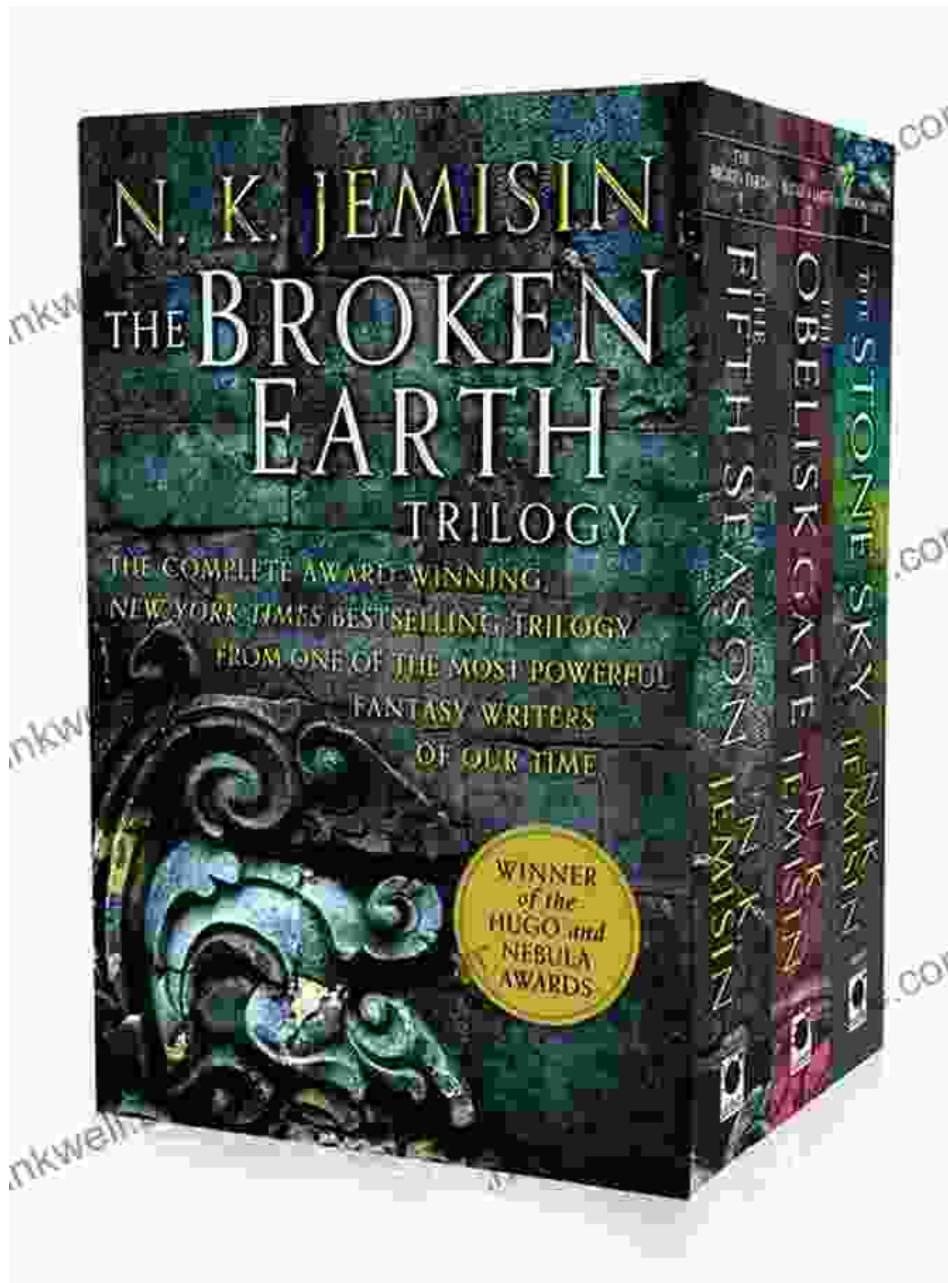

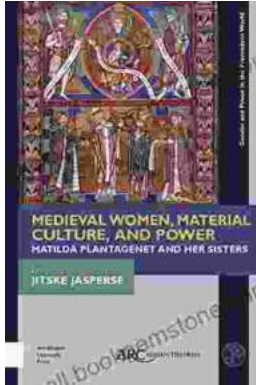

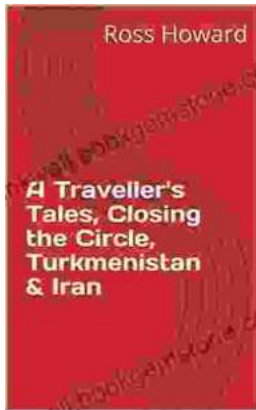
